# Background

- · There is a greater burden of neonatal mortality in Frenchspeaking African contexts<sup>1</sup>
- · At current rates global and national targets to reduce neonatal mortality will not be met, with almost 90% of countries in Sub-Saharan Africa projected to risk missing the target for SDG 3.2<sup>2</sup>

# Objective

• We aim to bridge the implementation gap for small and sick newborn care (SSNC) in low resource settings by increasing access to and uptake of high-quality tools, readings and learnings in French

#### Methods

- The Implementation Toolkit for Small and Sick Newborn Care in French is partnered with the African Neonatal Association and funded by the Chiesi Foundation
- · It applies an innovative health system approach to bring together learnings, tools, and readings in Small and Sick Newborn Care
- Resources are sorted into eight health systems building blocks and three core components:


